Topics will include: prehistoric art, art of the ancient Near East, Ancient Egypt, Greece, and Rome; early Medieval European art; Romanesque and Gothic art and architecture; religious representation and symbols in art; and connections between art of various cultures. This course will also emphasize art techniques and key figures in art history.

- B. PowerPoint presentations to provide visual reference points for contextualizing art works, artifacts and architecture and their themes, techniques and historical contexts.
- C. Instructions on critical and analytical writing to prepare students to produce an analysis of at least one major period and style of art in the western world.
- D. DVDs or streaming videos showing in-depth analyses of artifacts, styles, and periods.

    - a. Focused research paper on one major period of Art history studied in class

a. On-line class project, such as a wiki art history timeline, designed to consider the trajectory and impact of art throughout history
